The state song or *Rajya gaan* was sung to initiate and set the tone of the programme. Both teachers and students took part. This was followed by the official address of Dr. Manas Kabi, Principal, Asutosh College. On the opening day, 2<sup>nd</sup> of January, a series of Students' Welfare Seminars were organized. Issues included Human Trafficking, Gender Equity, and Sensitization and Cyber Crime.

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international community. Victim protection and assistance, as well as proactive steps to address the underlying reasons of vulnerability, are critical components of any anti-trafficking approach. Faculty members from the Department of Journalism and Mass Communication and Sociology delivered the lecture on 'Human Trafficking'.

The session was divided into two major sections. Smt. Jayita Das from the Dept of Sociology spoke on child trafficking issues in India and its major causes. She explained the various social and economic factors responsible for child trafficking. In the second session, Dr. Priyanka Roy from the Department of Journalism and Mass Communication highlighted the problem of human trafficking and gave an overview of the Anti-Trafficking Laws in India. Audio-visual content was also presented which helped students grasp the subject better. Dr. Roy also mentioned how communities may help prevent human trafficking by remaining attentive, reporting suspicious activity, and engaging in awareness efforts. The role of the media in this regard was also highlighted. The sessions were interactive where the students participated actively. They shared their social media usage patterns and habits. Faculty members of the college also agreed on the value of the event and the importance of raising awareness about the issue.

The speakers for the second session on 'Gender Equity and Sensitization' were Dr. Sanchita Sanyal, Dr. Subhasri Ghosh and Dr. Chandrima Bhar, Assistant Professors from the Departments of Political Science, History, and Philosophy respectively. Dr. Sanyal said the introduction of a third gender is a significant step towards encouraging diversity, inclusivity, and recognising the presence of people whose gender identities do not fit inside the standard dichotomy of male and female. Many communities have recognised and accepted the notion of a third gender, often known as non-binary gender, as part of attempts to understand and appreciate the diversity of human experiences.

While giving her speech on The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012, Dr. Subhasri Ghosh said that this is a huge step towards resolving the terrible issue of child sexual abuse in India. It seeks to defend children's rights and hold those who commit sexual offences against them responsible through a specialised judicial process. She explained how the Act outlines a wide range of sexual offences against minors, including sexual assault, sexual harassment, employing a child for pornographic purposes, and penetrative sexual assault.

Dr. Chandrima Bhar during her session said that Creators, media professionals, and society as a whole must critically assess how gender issues are portrayed in yarious means of communication. Promoting accurate, varied, and portrayals helps to build a more inclusive and equitable understanding of gender where the professionals, and society as a whole must critically assess how gender issues are portrayed in yarious means of communication.

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towards gender roles. The media has the ability to affect cultural norms and may be a catalyst for positive change by challenging negative stereotypes and encouraging equality. She also explained gender stereotypes and their changing pattern in recent times, citing examples from advertisements.

Tuesday's programme ended with a cyber awareness programme where Sri Suvankar Chakraborty of the Cyber Cell and SOG (Special Operation Group) units of Kolkata Police, gave advice on how to use social media sites safely and guard against online fraud. In the era of artificial intelligence, indiscriminately publishing photographs on public platforms may aid in reliving memories, but it can also be interpreted as data by cybercriminals, who could harm the person's reputation. During the hour-long lecture, the speaker spoke extensively about Artificial Intelligence (AI), characterising it as a "problem of the future". He presented a short clip of criminals using a 9-year-old's photographs to steal her real identity. Mr. Chakraborty stated that while technology undoubtedly makes life easier, safety is still a must when using it.

He also stressed that parents should refrain from posting excessive amounts of information about their children's accomplishments and activities on social media.

#### 03.01.2024

On 3rd January a poster-making competition and debate session were organised. The purpose of the poster-making competition was to encourage students' creative expression and assess their understanding of various environmental challenges. The competition on the topic-'Pollution and Environment' was to get the students thinking, in addition to evaluating them on their artistic abilities. Students from various departments entered the competition with great enthusiasm. Judges of the event were Dr. Parikshit Dutta, Dr.Kunal Sinha, and Dr.Surama Bera, Assistant Professors from the departments of Physics, Electronics, and Communicative English respectively.

Students' capacity to acquire fundamental critical thinking and presentation skills can be enhanced by engaging in discussions and debate. Debates are about more than just arguing over a subject by teaching individuals how to think logically in general. They are intended to train both parties to think and enable them to consider both sides of an argument. Around 50 students from various departments participated in the debate on the topic 'Artificial Intelligence (AI) is a threat to Humans'. Dr. Sanchita Sanyal, Dr. Subhasri Ghosh and Dr. Riddhi Saha, Assistant Professors from the departments of Political Science, History and Communicative English respectively, acted as judges

#### 04.01.24

Our ability to make decisions, form connections, and influence the environment around us as individuals and as a society is largely dependent on our mental health. A fundamental human right is mental health. Furthermore, it is essential for socioeconomic, communal, and personal growth.

Beginning on January 2 and continuing till January 8, Asutosh College celebrated the annual Students' Week in collaboration with the Students' Union and the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The topic of mental health and wellbeing was covered on the third day of the programme. Sessions on "stress management" and "counselling for mental health" were arranged. It was conducted by the Psychology Department faculty members and included an interactive session. Around 100 Students from Santoshpur Rishi Aurobindo Balika Vidyapith, Modernland Girls High School and Garfa D.N.M Girls' High School and Garfa DNM High School, spoke schools in the Asutosh College Hub centre, attended the session.

Smt. Sneha Bharaty from the Psychology department was the speaker for the first session. She discussed and described how the body and brain behave. She also discussed how our mental processes work. She highlighted that the 'mind is body and body, mind' and that the mind, too, has health. She encouraged students to talk about their likes and dislikes with regard to psychological counselling.



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Dr. Ananya Mondal led the second "stress management" session. She informed the students about the various stages of stress as a psychology expert. She gave the students guidance on how to recognize the signs of stress and how to deal with it.

Students' and teachers' concerns about psychological upliftment, the reasons for growing student stress, and society's part in it were discussed throughout the interactive session. These queries were excellently addressed by Dr. Rimjhim Ray, Head, Department of Psychology and other faculty members from the department. Appropriate suggestions were made for their

mental well-being. They encouraged students not to see mental health problems as taboo and to seek professional help when needed.

#### <u>05.01.24</u>

On 5<sup>th</sup> January the National Service Scheme (NSS) organized a Health and Eye check up for students, teaching and non-teaching staff. The eye check-up was done by Dr. Kaushick Biswas, ophthalmologist and eye surgeon, attached with The Calcutta Medical Research Institute. The College's internal healthcare professional checked blood pressure, pulse, oxygen saturation, blood sugar, and body weight as part of the health examination.

Another component of the yearly Students' Week programme was an interactive exposure visit by Higher Secondary students to selected laboratory-based departments of the college. Participants included students of classes XI and XII from Santoshpur Rishi Aurobindo Balika Vidyapith, Garfa DNM Girls' High School, Garfa DNM High School and Modernland Girls' High School. The visit was coordinated by the departments of Industrial Fish & Fisheries, Business Administration, Computer Science, Microbiology, Biochemistry, Environmental Science, Electronics, Chemistry, Journalism & Mass Communication, Communicative English, and Physics. Students learned about the various fields of study which are now offered at the undergraduate level. During the lab tour, students had a chance to see the different kinds of equipment that are utilized in practical applications. They also interacted with the faculty members of the concerned departments.

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7th of January. Dr. Panchajanya Ghatak, Consultant Psychiatrist, Rampton Hospital, U.K was the speaker for the day. He defined the term Psychiatry. He also classified the psychiatry under different categories like child and adolescent psychiatry, elderly psychiatry, forensic psychiatry, etc. Dr. Ghatak also discussed the relation between mind, brain and personality. Discussion on common mental illness among students like phobia, anxiety disorder, depression, bipolar affective disorder. Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), mental disease treatment (biological, psychological, and social), how to deal with mental illness, and the need of counselling and psychotherapy were all addressed in depth. The webinar aimed to promote personal well-being, reducing the stigma and encouraging self-care.

#### 08.01.24

The Students' Week programme concluded on Monday, January 8<sup>th</sup>, 2024, with a Career and Placement Fair. Prominent national and international companies and institutions were present at the event, which was organized by the Placement Cell. The fair was attended by both present and former students.

Professionals from organizations such as Axis Bank, RICE, and T.I.M.E. & SS Advisors gave the students advice on how to write a CV, prepare for interviews and group discussions, and explore alternative career opportunities available to them as students. Students who attended the sessions by RICE and Ziel Classes underwent an aptitude test.

#### Scholarship Awareness Camp and Helpdesk

The Student Scholarship Helpdesk Programme conducted from January 2nd to 4th, 2024 at *Asutosh College*, aimed to provide assistance to students seeking information and guidance on various scholarship opportunities like Swami Vivekananda Scholarship & Aikyashree, initiated by the Government of West Bengal, Private Scholarships from LIC, HDFC and Central government scholarship: Inspire. The programme witnessed an enthusiastic participation of students who sought clarification on diverse aspects related to scholarships.

**BRIEF REPORT ABOUT THE EVENT/ PROGRAMME:** A motivational talk was arranged for student's welfare that was attended by students of both hub centre and seven spoke colleges. The seminar was divided into four unique sessions where the audience was enlightened by three distinguished speakers.

Session 1: Swami Tatparanandaji Maharaj –

Swami Tatparanandaji Maharaj, the coordinator of Ramkrishna Mission Vidayalaya enlightened the audience on the the 'Resources of Wellbeing'. Swamiji emphasised on the wellbeing of our inner self. In a world full of constant competition and comparison of oneself with others in every aspect it is extremely important to understand that we are the makers of our own destiny. We are always in the search of happiness, however happiness is not defined by what someone else thinks it to be, rather it is only us who can actually determine the meaning and depth of one's own happiness. He focussed on the significance of controlling our senses and practice of 'tapasya' to achieve our goals.

Session 2: Dr. Sujit Roy –

Dr. Sujit Roy, General Physician, Merryland Nursing Home, discussed in details about the importance of health awareness. He stressed on the problems associated with cigarette smoking and the harmful effects of nicotine, our heart, kidney and how the brain too gets



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affected. His speech also emphasised on the negative effects of carbon monoxide and how it raises the risk of lung cancer. He discussed how simple habits such as regular use of hand wash and good food intake can help us lead a disease-free life.

## Session 3: Dr. Dipankar Mukherjee

Dr. Dipankar Mukherjee, BHR University Hospitals NHS Trust, London, U.K, gave a a powerful speech on the topic – 'Mental health and well-being challenges of young adults. What can we do now?' In a life that is a quest for perfection, we all want to be perfect but we all cannot be one. He focussed on opening up on mental health and accepting it if we face any. Constant fear of what people might say, the fear of social taboo leads to self-harm so we need to call it out. The race towards achievement creates immense pressure amongst students. Society is still highly judgemental. So, we need to engage in positive activities, to be in the moment, to be kind to oneself, to allow imperfections, reward oneself and have a sense of purpose.

# Session 4: Shibayan Ganguly

Shibayan Ganguly, a Clinical Dietician, had an extremely informative session on 'The Essential Acupressure Points for Emergency Situations'. The basic knowledge of what should be done in a situation of emergency before we receive medical help was well-explained and demonstrated. Such as a person who is suddenly feeling extremely depressed should try to control his emotions as our emotional mind hijacks our intellectual mind. He stressed on the importance of knowing one's own red flags, understanding our health better so that help can be received on time.
