Report on Special Lecture on Oral to Digital Communication

Title : Tracing the Arc of Expression: Landmark Seminar Examines Communication's Past, Present and Digital Future

Objectives:

- To trace the historical evolution of human communication from oral traditions to the digital age.
- To examine the limitations and advantages of each stage of communication technology.
- To discuss the impact of digitalization on oral and folk art forms and explore strategies for preserving and revitalizing India's rich communication heritage
- To foster interactive dialogue on balancing technological progress with cultural preservation.

Brief Report:

On May 7, 2025, the Department of Journalism and Mass Communication at Asutosh College, in collaboration with the IQAC Cell, organized an enlightening seminar titled "*Tracing the Stages: Evolution of Human Communication from Oral to Digital.*" The event, held at the Seminar Hall of the Centenary Building from 1 PM onwards, featured **Dr. Shaktipada Kumar**, Assistant Professor in the Department of English at Cooch Behar Panchanan Barma University, as the esteemed guest speaker. The seminar attracted a large number of students and faculty members, fostering an interactive and engaging atmosphere. Dr. Kumar took the audience on a captivating journey through the five stages of human communication evolution: Oral & Gesture Stage, Scrabble/Transcriptional Stage, Printing Technology Stage, Audio/Visual Stage, Digital Communication Stage.

Dr. Kumar emphasized that while digitalization has upgraded communication, it cannot replace the essence of oral traditions. He illustrated this with examples like the Chhau Dance, which adapted during the COVID-19 pandemic by moving performances online, yet retained its cultural roots. The seminar highlighted the richness of Indian oral traditions. The Rasas (emotional expressions) in Chhau Dance, such as Shringara (love) and Raudra (anger), showcasing its depth as a communicative art form, through visuals from his own documentary.

However, challenges like cultural gaps and the decline of folk arts were addressed. Dr. Kumar noted that urban detachment and Western influences have led to a loss of pride in traditional forms like Chhau, making revival efforts crucial.

The seminar concluded with a lively Q&A session, where Dr. Kumar answered questions ranging from the role of slang in songs (Tusu) to the limitations of digital communication. And finally, ended on a melodious note, with Dr. Kumar singing an original composition traditional song, leaving the audience inspired and reflective about the enduring power of human communication.

The seminar provided a profound understanding of how communication has evolved while underscoring the irreplaceable value of oral traditions. Attendees left with a renewed appreciation for India's cultural heritage and the dynamic interplay between tradition and technology.
